


ALL THINGS NEW 2022 IGNATIAN GATHERING FOR YOUNG ADULTS (18-30years)



We proclaim a crucified Christ

To all the faithful of the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

The XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops

For a synodal Church: communion, participation, and mission

My dear friends,

It would seem during this time of 'lockdown' and physical isolation, that the impulse to seek ways of hearing each other's voices, of listening deeply and of finding life-giving pathways together, have resonated deeply within each of us. Here in Melbourne, we have begun the journey towards personal and parish renewal; Australia-wide we have only just finished the first Session of the National Plenary Council; and this week we launch, in its local context, the Diocesan Phase of the Synod of Bishops. (The ACBC website has some helpful timelines to note: https://www.catholic.org.au/synodalchurch).

Whilst this might seem to be a case of challenging diary management, particularly during this time of uncertainty, there is no 'chance' occurrence of the interweaving between our Take the Way of the Gospel, the Council, and the Synod. At the local, national, and universal levels – the Holy Spirit's compelling call to all the people of God, the Body of Christ in the world, towards paths of profound renewal are reverberating loudly through every facet of our lives.

With this letter I launch and invite you as faithful of Melbourne into the synodal journey for the universal Church that was commenced with the official opening of the XVI Ordinary General Synod of Bishops on 10 October. It is now our opportunity to begin engagement in this important two-year convocation that seeks to hear and consider how we are walking together as a synodal Church in our announcing of the Gospel? And what steps the Spirit invites us to take in order to grow in our "walking together"?

To do this, the Church is seeking to draw in the participation of the greatest number of people in order to listen deeply and attentively to the living voice of the entire People of God. The purpose of this first phase is consultation at our local level, and the Proclaim Team will be co-ordinating how we can capture the richness and wealth of our experiences of lived synodality across our Church here in Melbourne. You will be hearing more in the coming weeks, please take some time to read more in preparation:

I strongly encourage your participation, and there will be varying mechanisms for individual and group submissions. Beautifully, the preparatory document has also encouraged us not to merely think of producing mere documentation of activity – but offer a dialogue, as the Holy Father reminds us, "to plant dreams, draw forth prophecies and visions, allow hope to flourish, inspire trust, bind up wounds, weave together relationships, awaken a dawn of hope, yearn from one another and create a bright resourcefulness that will enlighten minds, warm hearts, give strength to our hands." (Pope Francis 2018)

In the opening ceremony last week, Bro Alois, the Superior of the Taizé community, was invited to share some thoughts:

"This synodal process comes at a crucial moment when we can see two contradictory developments. On the one hand, humanity is becoming more clearly aware that we are all linked to each other and to the whole of creation. On the other hand, polarisation is growing in the social, political, and ethical domains, causing new divisions in societies, between countries, and even within families. Unfortunately, between our churches and also within them, there is a trend for differences to become polarisations that separate people, at a time when our witness to peace is vital...How can we move Christian unity forward?"

This certainly is what we have been asking of ourselves locally, nationally, and now globally. It is not a 'dragging of feet' against the tide – but a joyful embracing of the Holy Spirit's call as to what is possible. Again, there is no 'chance,' we only need to open our ears and hearts.

Every session of the Second Vatican Council began with the prayer Adsumus, Sancte Spiritus, "We stand before You, Holy Spirit," This same prayer was invoked during the first Session of the Plenary Council, and I share it with you now...

We stand before You, Holy Spirit, as we gather together in Your name. With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts: Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it. We are weak and sinful: do not let us promote disorder. Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path nor partiality influence our actions. Let us find in You our unity so that we may journey together to eternal life and not stray from the way of truth and what is right. All this we ask of You, who are at work in every place and time. in the communion of the Father and the Son,

forever and ever. Amen.

Second Reading Heb 5:1-6

You are a priest forever in the line of Melchizedek.

Every high priest has been taken out of mankind and is appointed to act for men in their relations with God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins; and so he can sympathise with those who are ignorant or uncertain because he too lives in the limitations of weakness. That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: You are my son, today I have become your father, and in another text: You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever.

Gospel Mk 10:46-52

Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

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Reflection by Greg Sunter

This passage from the Gospel of Mark draws to a close a significant section of the gospel. It stretches from 8:22 to this passage, 10:52. Like other examples in the Gospel of Mark, the stories at the beginning and end of the section are related and shed light on what they surround. Like this passage, the event at the beginning of the section is an account of the healing of a blind man. Contained within the two healings of blindness, as we have seen over the last six weeks, is an extended lesson on discipleship. Within this section, Jesus speaks about his upcoming death on three occasions and each time the disciples display their own form of blindness when they fail to understand what Jesus is trying to tell them guite explicitly. In this section, we have heard that discipleship involves suffering and hardship; it means placing one's own needs last and the needs of others first; and that discipleship is all about faith.

In this healing of blind Bartimaeus, we see all the hallmarks of what Jesus has been trying to teach the disciples in the preceding episodes. As a blind man, Bartimaeus would be regarded as 'imperfect' incomplete and consequently in a permanent state of uncleanliness. He would not be allowed to live within the bounds of normal society, nor have contact with people. So it is that Jesus encounters Bartimaeus on the side of the road, outside the city walls as he is leaving Jericho. Learning that it is Jesus passing by, Bartimaeus calls on Jesus to help him and the crowd tries to shut him up and remind him of his status. But Jesus calls Bartimaeus to him and, placing the needs of the other first, asks 'What do you want me to do for you?' When Bartimaeus makes his request, Jesus announces that it his faith that has saved him and his sight is restored. Bartimaeus, like a good disciple, then follows Jesus on the road.
