

LAMP; LOVE & MENTAL PEACE:

A second session on spirituality and mental health will be conducted at St Mary's Parish, in the Gathering Space on Thursday March, 3rd, from 7.30pm until 9.00pm. RELIGIOUS DISCRIMINATION LEGISLATION

We can at times cringe or even feel ashamed when we read what the media publicises about what the Catholic Church may do or state about matters, especially in the area of morals. I know many people have turned away from the Church because of the positions they understand the Church has adopted in various aspects of social life. Sometimes it is more embarrassing when the Catholic Church says nothing regarding important social issues where it could faithfully represent the compassionate and inclusive teachings of Jesus.

With the current Religious Discrimination Bill being debated by the Federal Government, it appears that the Catholic Church is just one among all Christians who are lobbying the Government to discriminate against homosexual and transgender people in its concern to end discrimination of religious organisations. But the strong Christian lobby does not represent all Christians, and maybe the Catholic Church needs to officially distance itself from this lobby.

I attach an article written by Fr. Bill Edebohls, the parish priest of Ivanhoe (and with his permission) that clearly articulates this issue and the Catholic Church's position on the matter.

RELIGIOUS DISCRIMINATION LEGISLATION THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY

The current debate on the Religious Discrimination Bill, both inside and outside of Federal Parliament, has brought out the best and the worst of politicians, religious leaders and people of faith.

The worst of it is the Australian Christian Lobby, based in Canberra, who have many politicians in their thrall and wield such power that politicians are fearful of incurring their eternal wrath. Hence the amended Religious Discrimination Bill has been pulled from the parliament by the Prime Minister, not just because it has divided his own party but because the religious right (represented by the Australian Christian Lobby) has demanded it.

What is ugly about this is that the Australian Christian Lobby presumes to represent the Christians of Australia and the media and politicians are sucked in by this fallacy. They represent a small sector of right wing protestant and pentecostal fundamentalists who have little understanding of traditional Christianity as lived out by mainstream Christianity. They certainly don't represent the Catholic Faith in which I was raised as an Anglican and now practice as a Roman Catholic.

It is, of course, good that we strive to end religious discrimination but we don't do it by discriminating against others. If the Australian Christian Lobby and supposed Christian politicians were being true to the faith they profess and the gospel of Jesus, as exemplified in today's gospel (the Beatitudes), they ought be a lot less interested in passing self-interested laws about religious discrimination and spend more time lobbying for laws against this nation's discrimination against asylum seekers who arrive by boat instead of a plane. And as a nation we still have a long way to go in ending discrimination against our indigenous peoples, non-whites, the disabled, homosexual and transgender people, the homeless etc. etc. I have never heard the Australian Christian Lobby lobby for any of these vulnerable groups. Shamelessly, they lobby for themselves and their own restrictive, fundamentalist version of a faith that is unrecognizable to most Christians. Jesus would not be amused!

The most odious feature of the proposed bill enshrines the right of people of faith to discriminate against homosexual and transgender children in 'religious' schools. Under pressure from his own party the Prime Minister was forced to amend the bill so as to end discrimination on the grounds of sexuality but to maintain the right to discriminate against transgender children.

Sadly, on both the left and the right of politics, we are drowning under the ideology of 'rights' - my rights - my freedoms. Individual rights and freedoms are important but individual rights and freedoms do not give me the right to harass, vilify, ostracise, harm or discriminate against another. If we were less narcissistic we would care less about our rights and more about our responsibilities. Our responsibility towards society, towards the common good, towards the 'other', especially the most vulnerable and disparaged in our community.

In the midst of this debate over the effects of the proposed anti discrimination laws, the thing I am most proud of is our Catholic Schools who have a reputation of amazing pastoral care of children dealing with issues of sexuality and gender fluidity. During the past week ABC radio talk-back was alive with parents and students ringing in to commend their Catholic School for the support and encouragement they had received in dealing with issues of sexuality and gender that can be so confronting for our children when faced with discrimination and worse.

The Prime Minister's rush to introduce this long promised bill just before parliament rises in preparation for the coming federal election may in fact be less about trying to rush through an old election promise and more to do with wedging the Opposition and distracting voters from more important issues but we as a nation deserve better leadership. But not just political leadership! We need real leadership in the Church so that the joy of the Gospel and the teachings of Jesus can be proclaimed by real prophets who have the moral courage to speak truth to power rather than allowing a lobby group, espousing a dim and dark shadow of the Christian faith, to speak on our behalf.

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SYNOD 2023: You may know that Pope Francis has asked all Catholics to participate in a global consultation. He is seeking feedback for what dream we have for the Church. Many of you participated in the Plenary discussions in 2018. That was an Australian initiative and we haven't yet heard the results of that project. Will you come and join in an evening of reflection so that we can respond to the Pope's call. The focus is Community, Participation and Mission. We really need to raise our voices here. At present there have only been just over 250 responses Australia wide, and the project was launched in November. Unfortunately for us in the Southern Hemisphere, everything stops from mid December until January, when we are focussed on preparing for Christmas and then January is a very quiet month as people go on holidays. LECTIONARY ART AND REFLECTION BY JENNY CLOSE

'Love your enemies' is one of the most challenging teachings of Jesus. It seems an impossible ideal, but Jesus gave us a practical example in the way he faced the terror of the cross. The problem is that living this way is inherently risky – especially when violence and terrorism occur and revenge seems a more efficient solution than reconciliation. Reaching out in love is clearly the radical Christian way, however.

Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

20 February 2022

First Reading 1 Sm 26:2. 7-9. 12-13. 22-23

The Lord has put you in my power, but I will not raise my hand against you.

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph.

So in the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him.

Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice. David answered Abishai, Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt?' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. No one saw, no one knew, no one woke up; they were all asleep, for a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen on them.

David crossed to the other side and halted on the top of the mountain a long way off; there was a wide space between them. David then called out, 'Here is the king's spear. Let one of the soldiers come across and take it. The Lord repays everyone for his uprightness and loyalty. Today the Lord put you in my power, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed.'

Responsorial Psalm

Second Reading 1 Cor 15:45-49

Just as we have carried the earthly image, we must carry the heavenly image.

The first man, Adam, as scripture says, became a living soul; but the last Adam has become a life-giving spirit. That is, first the one with the soul, not the spirit, and after that, the one with the spirit. The first man, being from the earth, is earthly by nature; the second man is from heaven. As this earthly man was, so are we on earth; and as the heavenly man is, so are we in heaven. And we, who have been modelled on the earthly man, will be modelled on the heavenly man.

Gospel Acclamation Jn 13:34

Alleluia, alleluia!

I give you a new commandment; love one another as I have loved you.

Gospel Lk 6:27-38

Be merciful as your Father is merciful.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I say this to you who are listening: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked.'

'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned. Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'



Reflection by Greg Sunter

The radical teaching that was begun in last week's gospel as the beatitudes and woes is continued in this week's challenge to be forgiving, compassionate and generous in the same way that God expresses abundant love. As with the blessings and curses of the Beatitudes passage, this teaching continues the challenge to act against cultural and social expectations. Who would be surprised if you were to express hatred for an enemy or for someone who hates you or treats you badly? But Jesus tells his disciples to love their enemies and to do good to those who hate them. His instruction is contrary to the 'normal' way of doing things – and that's exactly the message Jesus wanted to convey! Rather than a spiteful, vengeful God who keeps score and punishes wrongdoing, Jesus presents a compelling image of a God of unbounded compassion and abundant generosity.

In this passage we find one version of the Golden Rule that appears repeatedly throughout the gospels (as well as most other religious traditions): 'Treat others as you would like them to treat you.' It is followed up with a comment that it takes no effort to treat well people whom you like – anybody can do that. The challenge is to treat people you don't like as you would like to be treated yourself. In a society that had very strict rules about the way to treat different people and clearly established boundaries between different groups, this was a tough ask by Jesus. Bear in mind also that there was an occupying army in the country and Jesus was encouraging the people to treat even their enemies, the Romans, with love, compassion and forgiveness. This was a radical and challenging teaching!

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
