

UPDATE ON THE PROPOSED ADDITIONAL TABERNACLE

Dear Parishioners,

A number of St. Thomas parishioners have requested that we consider having a tabernacle in a place of prominence in the church. However, we already have the Adoration chapel that has been built in such a way that it is accessible for people to come to pray at any time or collect the Blessed Sacrament to take to the sick without actually going into the body of the church. Since there may not be two tabernacles used for the reservation of the Eucharist in the church, a few options have been considered:

- 1. That a wall be built to separate the current Adoration chapel with the current tabernacle from the body of the church, and have another tabernacle in what is currently the Seasonal chapel.
- 2. That we have 2 tabernacles, but the Blessed Sacrament is only in one of them at any particular time—so the Blessed sacrament would be reserved in the Adoration chapel and would only be brought into the church's tabernacle before Masses and be returned after Mass. This would mean that a wall would not be erected between the church and the Adoration chapel.
- 3. That we do nothing because any other option would impact on the integrity of the original design of the church that intended to separate the place of reservation of the Blessed Sacrament from the body of the church.

No other options have been considered at this stage. An initial meeting was held a few weeks ago and it was decided that we would "test the waters" by placing a screen between the church and the Adoration chapel and place another tabernacle in the church for the reservation of the Eucharist during Mass. Please note: THESE ARE ONLY TEMPORARY. I am pleased to say that the response to the request for feedback has been wonderful and passionate. They are indicative of the importance that is placed on the reservation of the Eucharist in our church and the love of the church building itself. Please continue to submit feedback if you wish, but to do so within the next week. I would like to bring the originally proposed meeting to an earlier date than October 5th. May I suggest we meet on **Wednesday 14th of September at 7 pm**. in the church.

I would like to use that meeting as an opportunity to genuinely listen to one another and arrive at a consensus together for the sake of our parish community, both now and into the future.

Lectionary Art and Reflection by Jenny Close

The nature of discipleship is the focus of this gospel reading. To be a true disciple, it is necessary to put commitment to Jesus before relationships, material possessions, comfort and safety.

Twenty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

4 September 2022

First Reading Wis 9:13-18

Who can comprehend the will of God?

What man can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable; for a perishable body presses down the

for a perishable body presses down the soul,

and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind.

It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth,

laborious to know what lies within our reach;

who, then, can discover what is in the heavens?

As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 89:3-6. 12-14. 17. R. v.1

(R.) In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

- 1. You turn men back into dust and say: 'Go back, sons of men.'
 To your eyes a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night. (R.)
- You sweep men away like a dream, like grass which springs up in the morning.
 In the morning it springs up and flowers: by evening it withers and fades. (R.)
- 3. Make us know the shortness of our life that we may gain wisdom of heart. Lord, relent! Is your anger for ever? Show pity to your servants. (R.)
- 4. In the morning, fill us with your love; we shall exult and rejoice all our days. Let the favour of the Lord be upon us: give success to the work of our hands. (R.)

Second Reading Phlm 9-10, 12-17

Receive him, not as a slave anymore, but as a very dear brother.

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him - I could say - a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

Gospel Acclamation Ps 118:135


Alleluia, alleluia! Let your face shine on your servant, and teach me your laws. Alleluia!

Gospel Lk 14:25-33

All who do not renounce their possessions cannot be my disciples.

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.



Reflection by Nick Brodie

A common thread that runs through this week's readings is the passing of time. We are told that God's intentions transcend and outlast ours, that our lives are short and our bodies dust. But none of this is cause for worry so much as a reality check, a reminder that we are all Created Beings living within a wider Creation. An elderly St Paul speaks of deprivation 'for a time' before turning his attention to human relationships and eternal hopes, reminding us that the Resurrection for which we hope is Creation renewed in Communion in Christ.

While we are celebrating the Season of Creation, such Scripture therefore also reminds us that Creation's 'season' is eternal. This helps us make sense of this week's seemingly troubling Gospel passage where Jesus speaks of 'hating' loved ones, even 'hating' our own lives, and His insistence that we give up all our possessions. Jesus' point is that our relationships with people and things should be part of a bigger, longer picture, and that our approach towards Creation should not be possessive. Your mother is God's Creation. Your life is God's. Your possessions really belong to God. Which then begs the question: Do you approach Creation unselfishly?

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
