THE ORIGIN OF THE CHRISTMAS CRIB



The formation of the first Christmas crib is attributed to St Francis of Assisi. In 1223, just three years before his death, Francis went to visit the friars living in the remote mountain village of Greccio in central Italy. St Bonaventure, a leading medieval theologian and

Franciscan, tells us that in order to inspire the people of Greccio to celebrate the birth of the Saviour with all solemnity and devotion, Francis brought together all the elements of the stable in Bethlehem into what would become the very first Christmas crib.

Francis used real people, straw in a manger, an ox and a donkey, to bring the Christmas story to life for the people of Greccio. People came from far and wide to see this spectacle. The night was aglow with candlelight and the people were united in prayer as hymns were sung in praise of the God who is with us. St. Francis' idea of recreating the Nativity scene spread quickly all over the Christian world, and soon there were Christmas cribs in churches and homes and also in public places.

The crib remains a beacon of peace, hope and reconciliation and offers an opportunity for us to reflect upon the deeper message it represents. Our own Nativity scenes which rest under our Christmas trees are a visible reminder of that night when our Saviour was born. May we too embrace Him with all of our love as did St. Francis.

ADVENT

The season of Advent begins today, a period of waiting for the birth of Christ. It is the season of new beginnings: the start of the new liturgical year, Year A, the year of Matthew; the birth of Jesus; the beginning of summer. It is also a time for reflection about the coming of Jesus into our lives through grace and the sacraments, and a time to keep in mind that He will come again.

The overall theme for Advent this year is **Trust**. This concept has been strained for many people in recent years when the life we thought would be there for us was upended and changed, suddenly, without time for preparation. To have trust, there has to be a high degree of certainty, reliability, confidence, relationship. While recent world events may weaken our trust in our safety and security, our trust in God should not be diminished. Through our faith, we believe that God always loves us and will always care for us. Our God reaches out to us to offer us grace, mercy and salvation. We are invited into a deep relationship, one of complete trust, that enables us to look forward with hope, peace and joy, within a community of faith.

"So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with My righteous right hand" (Isaiah 41:10).

The focus for **the first week of Advent** is: *Trust and keep awake*.

The Gospel describes a cataclysmic event, a great flood that comes without warning. Noah placed his trust in God as he built and filled the ark. Everything was swept away and life had to be rebuilt. Jesus then alerted his disciples that second coming of the Son of Man would be similar. Some will be saved and others lost. Life can be very unpredictable and there is no set date for Jesus to return. What will He find when He comes? Will we be ready to be accountable for our lives? If we place our trust in Him and live our lives according to His teachings, we will be able to say with confidence, "Here I am, Lord".

A BRIEF INTRODUCTION OF SANDY STARBUCK, PASTORAL ASSOCIATE

Greetings to all Parishioners of St Mary's Greensborough, Sacred Heart Diamond Creek, St Peter's Hurstbridge and St Thomas the Apostle! I write this feeling quite excited (and a little bit nervous!) to introduce myself to you before joining you in person later this month. My background as a Catholic was one with foundations beginning as a child where both my parents were converted to the Catholic faith when their third child was born. I was born in southern California and attended a Catholic School, having received Holy Communion there. We moved to a small town in the Ozark Mountains of Missouri when I was 7 and after graduating from high school, I moved to the nearest city for work and attended business college where I studied medical administration.

I arrived in Melbourne 42 years ago as a young bride and we settled in Rosanna where my husband grew up and where we lived for 15 years, attending St Martin of Tours Parish where my children received the Sacraments.

We moved to Doreen in the early 90's and along with our family business I worked in medical administration until my journey came upon a new intersection on my road of faith as I found myself receiving communion at home recovering from surgery. I was asked to be the Pastoral Worker for the Epping Parish. During the years there I undertook study for a Bachelor of Theology and after 8 years I graduated in 2021.

During my final few years at uni an opportunity arose at the Parish of Christ the Light in Mernda, Doreen, Whittlesea, Kinglake for Pastoral Associate. Approaching 5 years there I had been feeling that God was calling me to make a change – I was uncertain as to what this change was to be until I became aware of this position at St. Mary's, Greensborough.

I reflected, prayed, sought advice of trusted friends/colleagues, went on retreat before (and after) applying for this position. I will quote a friend to sum up what came upon my heart during this discernment – "When the heart, soul and call come together as one – it is right and true."

So here I am – very humbled by the trust and faith shown by Fr Steven and those who made up the interview panel in appointing me. I pray to our Lord, that you find my door always open, my ears always listening and my heart always grateful to be of service to the people of St Mary's Parish.



Lectionary Art and Reflection by Jenny Close

Matthew's gospel, in this first week of Advent, reminds us to stay alert. The advice is timely since in Advent we are in waiting mode. We await the coming of the kingdom in the person of Jesus and in the fullness of time.

First Sunday of Advent, Year A

27 November 2022

First Reading Is 2:1-5

The Lord will gather all nations in eternal peace in the kingdom of God.

The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

In the days to come
the mountain of the Temple of the Lord
shall tower above the mountains
and be lifted higher than the hills.
All the nations will stream to it,
peoples without number will come to it;
and they will say:

'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord,

to the Temple of the God of Jacob that he may teach us his ways so that we may walk in his paths; since the Law will go out from Zion, and the oracle of the Lord from Jerusalem.'

He will wield authority over the nations and adjudicate between many peoples; these will hammer their swords into ploughshares,

their spears into sickles.

Nation will not lift sword against nation, there will be no more training for war.

O House of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 121:1-2. 4-5. 6-9. R. see v.1.

(R.) Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord.

- I rejoiced when I heard them say: 'Let us go to God's house.' And now our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem. (R.)
- It is there that the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord.
 For Israel's law it is, there to praise the Lord's name.
 There were set the thrones of judgement of the house of David. (R.)
- For the peace of Jerusalem pray: 'Peace be to your homes! May peace reign in your walls, in your palaces, peace!' (R.)
- 4. For love of my brethren and friends I say: 'Peace upon you!' For love of the house of the Lord I will ask for your good. (R.)

Second Reading Rom 13:11-14

The time has come, our salvation is near.

You know 'the time' has come: you must wake up now: our salvation is even nearer than it was when we were converted. The night is almost over, it will be daylight soon – let us give up all the things we prefer to do under the cover of the dark; let us arm ourselves and appear in the light. Let us live decently as people do in the daytime: no drunken orgies, no promiscuity or licentiousness, and no wrangling or jealousy. Let your armour be the Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Acclamation Ps 84:8

Alleluia, alleluia! Lord, show us your mercy and love, and grant us your salvation. Alleluia!

Gospel Mt 24:37-44

Stay awake, you must be ready.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'As it was in Noah's day, so will it be when the Son of Man comes. For in those days before the Flood people were eating, drinking, taking wives, taking husbands, right up to the day Noah went into the ark, and they suspected nothing till the Flood came and swept all away. It will be like this when the Son of Man comes. Then of two men in the fields one is taken, one left; of two women at the millstone grinding, one is taken, one left.

'So stay awake, because you do not know the day when your master is coming. You may be quite sure of this that if the householder had known at what time of the night the burglar would come, he would have stayed awake and would not have allowed anyone to break through the wall of his house. Therefore, you too must stand ready because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

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Reflection by Greg Sunter

The first Sunday of Advent sees the commencement of the new liturgical year. This new liturgical cycle is referred to as Year A and features the gospel of Matthew. (Year B features the gospel of Mark and Year C. that we have just completed, features the gospel of Luke.) Advent comes from the Latin word Adventus which literally means 'coming'; it is also reflected in the Greek word Parousia, which is used to describe the second coming of Jesus. So Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation of the coming of Christ into the world that is celebrated in the Nativity at Christmas. The gospel passage chosen for today's reading richly expresses that anticipation and need for preparation.

It may seem a little confusing that we begin our year-long exploration of the gospel of Matthew by taking a reading from chapter 24. However, the need for readiness and alertness that Jesus speaks about in relation to the coming of the Kingdom is equally suitable for a modern audience when preparing to celebrate once again the coming of Jesus into the world. Jesus is the best expression of the Kingdom that we have yet experienced and so rather than seeing the choice of this passage as a confusion, we should recognise the alignment that exists between the anticipation of the Kingdom and the anticipation of the Nativity.

The two great feasts of Christianity – the Nativity and Easter – are each preceded by a period of preparation: Advent and Lent. The emphasis of these seasons is on the mental and spiritual preparation to fully enter into one of the great mysteries of faith. In the Nativity, we celebrate God become human; God present in the world in a physical way. Advent is a time to remember the many and varied ways that God continues to be present in the world.
