
SILENCE IN LITURGY

PARTNERED PARISHES NEWS

Dear Parishioners of Sacred Heart, St. Mary's, and St. Thomas,

We anticipated 2022 as a year of relief from COVID lockdowns and restrictions, but it has turned out to be a year of yet more calamitous events. I will just name a few — Russia invades Ukraine, resulting in many deaths on both sides and increasing the already huge number of refugees in the world to over 100 million; tensions have grown with China; Climate Change intensifies with the result of droughts in many places overseas and floods in the Eastern states of Australia and elsewhere; as a result of COVID and the Ukrainian war there have been disruptions in global supply chains of food and fuels; inflation worldwide has returned with abandon; COVID continues to take the lives of great numbers worldwide; people with malicious intent have hacked into the private details of clients of big corporations; people have increasingly used social media to spread misinformation and disinformation, leading to many conspiracy theories that distort truth and facts; the Iranian protests against the tits theocratic regime and several other protests against what people have deemed oppressive and authoritarian governments. This has certainly been a year of turmoil and calamities, and perhaps a year that beckons us to think and act differently from before. It seems to me that the choice is ours, individually and globally for things to change.

I have recently been reading a book — "The Choice — Even in hell hope can flower" by Dr. Edith Eger, a psychologist and survivor of the Holocaust who in the book guides its readers in how they should try and move on after trauma, a stark reality we all have to face in our lives. Painful and traumatic events in our lives reveal to us a yearning for something more and different. In the first chapter of the book she writes about the most common diagnosis among people she treats — it is hunger: "We are hungry. We are hungry for approval, attention, affection. We are hungry for the freedom to embrace life and to really know and be ourselves." Maybe the events of the last few years and this last year in particular can lead us to consider what we truly hunger for and what changes we need to make in our lives and world that would address our deepest yearnings and hunger.

As I reflect on the first Christmas, I think of the historically transformative event when God immersed himself intimately into the mess of human history because of God's great love for humanity and all created order. It was because God sought to address our great human hunger for the 'more' and for us to find it in him, and for us to participate in furthering God's creative plan for all creation. May we in the coming year be receptive to the ways God seeks to feed us and relieve our hunger for the more.

As we approach the end of 2022, I would like to express my gratitude and my well-wishes to you all, the parishioners of our three partnered parishes. Particularly, I would like to publicly express my gratitude to our Assistant priests – Martin Tanti and Tao Pham. In January we farewelled Dixon George as he accepted an appointment as assistant priest to the combined parishes of Thornbury, East Thornbury and Alphington, and we welcomed Martin Tanti who was parish priest of Collingwood/Clifton Hill, and has been seconded to us by the Salesian order of priests.

I am extremely grateful for the support and dedicated commitment to pastoral work in our parishes by Jacinta Bright and Sr. Margaret Sapsford, our Pastoral Associates. After almost 18 years as our Pastoral Associate at St. Mary's, Jacinta retired in October. I am grateful for the ways I have been able to work very closely with Jacinta over that period of time and for the ways she has assisted us in our efforts in partnering our three parishes. Jacinta continues to work as a spiritual director and counsellor. In a time when there is also a dearth of Pastoral Associates, I am very grateful that we have been able to employ Sandy Starbuck who has now taken on the role of Pastoral Associate and commenced work with us at the end of November.

Sandy comes with 12 years of experience from St. Peter's, Epping and Christ the Light Parish of Doreen, Kinglake, Mernda and Whittlesea and will continue in the role Jacinta has left.

I am particularly grateful to Pat Guatta, Lisa Leahy, Francesca Olofsson and Sharon Prosser, our parish secretaries who are the immediate face and voice of the parish offices and who especially assist me in my administrative responsibilities. We regularly meet as a Parish Team and have refined ways that we work together across our three parishes. Over the past year we have developed more ways we can work together across our three parishes, such as our combined faith Development Team which prepares the schedule of the Sacramental program for our three schools and prepares the Faith Formation evenings for our school parents; our combined Liturgy group which plans the seasons of liturgical celebrations and major feasts, and our Partnered Parishes Plenary Facilitators Committee which explored ways we can implement in our own locality the expressions of parishioners for change in the Church. One of these resulted in the plaques positioned in prominent places on rocks near each of our churches that express our sorrow for the pain of abuse perpetrated by officials of the Church.

Though online learning has ceased with the easing of COVID restrictions and lockdowns, this past year has been extremely demanding on our schools and teachers as they work to address the aftermath of how these have impacted on students and their parents. The coordination of this for the education and welfare of our children has required a great deal of wise leadership and coordination with staff and parents. I would like to express my deep gratitude to Jim O'Sullivan, David Delaney and Marisa Matthys, our school principals for their professional, calm and dedicated leadership. I value their work because it is together that we lead our parishes in pastoral care, education and spiritual formation, especially of our school communities.

We are also reliant on the many groups and committees with whom we work collaboratively, particularly the Parish Pastoral Councils, Finance Committees, the School Advisory Boards and Parish Education Board. I would like to express my deep gratitude to the many individuals and groups who dedicate so much time and energy to the life of our parishes in liturgy, pastoral care, catechesis, faith formation, fundraising, peer support and ministry and property maintenance and development because they are committed to the enrichment of our communities by what they do. In general I would like to thank everyone's involvement in the life of our parishes because your contribution and participation is what continues to give these communities their great spirit and energy and expresses a welcome to those who come to us with their needs.

Finally, I thank the many parishioners who have showered me with gifts for Christmas; for your thoughtfulness and care of me throughout the year. I pray that each of you may have a joyous, peace-filled celebration of Christmas with your loved ones. May God guard you and keep you safe these holidays, especially as you travel. I pray that you may be revitalized for the coming year and that God blesses you and your loved ones abundantly with all you need throughout 2023 – a new year of new opportunities for growth within ourselves, in our relationships with one another, and with God who continues to make his home among us in the messiness of our lives.

BIBLE STUDY GROUP

The Monday night bible study group on Zoom will commence "The Holy Land Revealed" video course Mon. 9th January 7.30-9.30pm.

This course covers the ancient history of what many people know as the Holy Land, a geographic area that includes modern Israel, Jordan, and the Palestinian territories. The course also looks at other regions in the ancient Near East, including Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey) and Mesopotamia (encompassing modern Iraq and much of Iran).

The timespan we will cover begins with the First Temple period (c. 960 B.C. □586 B.C.) and takes us through the Second Temple period, the time of Jesus, and the destruction of the temple (c. 516 B.C. □A.D. 70) Our historical sources for these periods of ancient history include the Hebrew Bible and related religious works, the Dead Sea Scrolls, the writings of Josephus and Philo, the New Testament, and the Mishnah and Talmud. We will also explore the archaeology of the ancient Near East, which will complement our study of the historical sources by giving us a more complete picture of ancient societies.

Joyful peace is the atmosphere of Luke's account of the birth of Jesus. Nonetheless, the peace arises amid the darker realities of life: 'there was no room for them at the inn'. Peace and joy are messages that we badly need today. More than ever we need to know that the light of Christ shines in the darkness and that the light is associated with the vulnerability of new life rather than the power of political might.

And suddenly with the angel there was a great throng of the heavenly host, praising God and singing:

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

The glory of God and profound peace reaching out to embrace the whole of humanity are dynamically related in the baby in the manger. This is the song of the angels, and it is our privilege to join in that song at this Christmas Mass.

Every baby is a promise of a new future which fills one with hope. But this baby is unique. This Jewish boy baby is the body language of God. This baby is the sonburst of God entering our dark world. This baby shows us that God is not impossibly remote but, rather, God is as intimately close as a vulnerable infant.

And *this* baby fulfils all the yearning of the human heart. We want to love to the utmost. We want to be loved to the utmost. *This* baby enables both because he is without any finite boundaries or restraints: He is in-finite love reaching out to us.

Can we grasp all this? Probably not. So, like the little lambs nuzzling up to the manger, we just follow some deep intuition which says: 'I must kneel in adoration, it is good to be here.' We could pause for a moment to pray for the resolve to do our bit to echo the angel's message: 'I bring you good news of great joy to be shared by all peoples.'
