Principal Pilgrimage

During the holidays I departed for Madrid in Spain as I embarked on following the footsteps of St James on the Camino de Santiago. I journeyed with my Catholic Principal colleagues. We travelled by bus from Madrid to the beautiful medieval city of León. Once there we were given a guided tour of the Cathedral de Santa Maria, then, onto Sarria where we would begin our walking pilgrimage of 118km.



Our first day walk of 23km was filled with torrential rain which only got heavier as we walked. Our next day was slightly brighter as we trekked for 26 km through lush forests and farmland, meeting pilgrims from all over the world throughout the day. Day 3 was 29km and the weather was delightful, thankfully not too warm we



traversed hills and deep valleys and then finally a rest day to care for our weary blistered feet. After our much needed rest day the next day's trek was better than expected...until the torrential rain set in. Luckily we had fabulous walking buddies, plenty of laughs, comradery and loads of resilience thrown in too.

The scallop shell has been linked to the Camino de Santiago since medieval times. Early pilgrims would travel from their home to Santiago and onwards to Finisterre (end of the earth). Once they reached Finisterre they would collect a scallop shell as proof they had walked the Camino de Santiago. They would use the scallop shell as a bowl for food and wine (healthier than water) offered to them. In modern times the scallop shell is a reflection of the Camino. The scallop shell is used as a marker along the journey. Many pilgrims choose to wear their scallop shell on their backpacks to show others that they are Camino pilgrims.







Not too many words could describe walking our final 16km mostly done in the heaviest torrential rain, wading through rivers, knowing there

were many kilometres ahead with shoes soaked through and another hill inevitably around the bend. Coming into Santiago was a memory I'll always treasure. On our final day of walking all of us pilgrims waited in the smaller square before congregating together and entering the main square together. We were all in awe of the atmosphere, the grandeur of the buildings while amongst other pilgrims from all walks of life and all parts of the world.

Dear Parents/Guardians,

I am writing to advise you of the School Fees and Levies for 2025. The Principal, in conjunction with the MACS FBP following the MACS Budget Guidance, has reviewed the level of School Fees and Levies and recommended the level of fees and levies for the following year.

There are three components of fees payable by parents as listed below.

School Fees (Charged per Family):

The School Fees for 2025 will be **\$2240**. The reason for this increase is noted below.

- This will assist the ongoing increased costs of running the school; electricity, water, gas, air conditioning, rates, increased expenditure in ICT, wages, levies and maintenance of our buildings.
- The Capacity to Contribute (CTC) is a measure of a school's ability to recover tuition fees based on the three-year average Direct Measure of Income (DMI) score of the school.
- To maintain the ability to keep up with the Capacity to Contribute which continues to increase therefore, our increase year on year is endeavouring to cover the cost.

The costs of running a school constantly increase and we want to provide the highest quality learning and teaching possible. We also believe in educating the 'whole child' that is spiritual, academic, social, emotional and physical. The increases to our School Fees are necessary to meet these challenges and continue to run a school which seeks excellence and keeps up with the rising costs of education.

We have ensured our fees still remain low compared with neighbouring Catholic schools.

As part of our mission as a Catholic school we hope that no student is disadvantaged because of the inability of parents to pay tuition fees. The **Concessional Fee Policy** is available to all Health Care Card/CSEF recipients. Please refer to https://www.smgreensborough.catholic.edu.au/school-fees/

Student Levy (Charged per Child):

The Student Levy provides the funding to allow St Mary's to implement and support programs to ensure we are continuing to educate the whole child in a personalised and engaging manner.

The per student levy for 2025 will be \$560 which assists payment for;

Intervention, Enrichment, Teaching of Italian Language for Years Prep to Year Six, Sacramental Program, Curriculum resources, Consumables, Photocopying, The ability to provide specialist programs and resources, including e-Smart Digital Licences for each student, Audio visuals, Transport for interschool sport, all classroom equipment, resources and stationery, some IT devices, programs and apps, essential assessment tools, Compass and our Website, Footsteps and the Resilience Project. All curriculum charges, including sports, activities and stationery items. (All stationery items will be purchased and distributed to your child in class as required through a bulk order).

In addition, a new levy:

Excursion / Incursions (\$60 per student per year) Swimming (\$75 per student)

In line with the MACS Budget guidance, direct levies (e.g. camps, excursions) must be set to recover the costs incurred in full.

The total student levy for 2025 = \$695

Capital Levy (Charged per Family):

In 2025 the Capital Levy will increase to \$580 to service the current loans plus saving for the planned future project.

We were successful in our 2023 submission for a capital grant to renovate the two-storey building. We are putting provisions in place to build the flexible learning spaces with smaller class sizes to ensure students experience the arts and science in improved comfortable and collaborative learning environments,

As a matter of justice to all parents, we must mitigate the problem of unmet financial obligations for those who can afford to pay. The school community cannot carry the burden of unpaid Fees and Levies. MACS has endorsed the need, when necessary, for Debt Collection for any unpaid fees.

Options to pay in full, instalments, or payment plan are offered. Payment in full is due by the 15^s June. Three instalment dates are the 15^s March, 15^s June and 15^s September. Payment plans for 2025 need to be submitted by the 1st of December 2024. The forms can be downloaded on the above link. All payment plans will be set as ongoing unless an end date is specified. St Mary's requests that a new form is submitted for existing payment plans to ensure all details are up to date.

Please note that if a payment plan set up, you must ensure that sufficient funds are available. A dishonour fee of \$20 will be added to accounts should a payment bounce, as St Mary's cannot continue to bear these costs.

Annual Accounts for School Fees, Levies and Camp will be sent out early February 2025.

The payment of fees is obligatory and part of acceptance by the school to educate your child. A copy of the 2025 Fee Schedule is included.



Report from Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council

Meeting 9 October, 2024

The following matters were discussed at this meeting:

Peace and Hope Service was held in September, planned by the three parishes and primary schools. All welcome.

Support and assistance were offered to Father Steven during this period when he is the only priest in the three parishes. Some priests are helping with the celebration of Masses in all three parishes.

Some members attended the Safeguarding meetings regarding completion of risk assessments.


Positive Behaviour



Would you like to hear about some of the behaviour support strategies which teachers are using at school?

Here is a strategy you might like to use at home if you find yourself in a debate with your child. It's called "Diffuse Debate" taken from the "The Classroom Management Handbook" (ref. Mark Dowley & Oliver Lovell 2024)

Routine: Defuse Debate



School scenario:

It's time for children to return to their tables to do some written work.

Horatio is still walking around the room and looks like he is avoiding the written task. The teacher checks for understanding and says, "do you know what you are meant to be doing right now?"

Horatio shrugs his shoulders and says "I don't want to do writing - I don't like it."

- 1. The teacher says: "That may be true but, you need to start your writing"
- 2. Horatio starts to play with the pencils on the ledge but the teacher ignores this second behaviour.
- 3. The teacher says, "Horatio, you have a choice, you can either begin your work now or you will need to stay in at break time and do it with me. Make a choice. "
- 4. Horatio remains at the ledge playing with the pencils. The teacher says, "Horatio, you need to make a choice, either you do the writing now or we do it together at break time.
- 5. The teacher walks away and supports other students at their tables.

After a couple of minutes, Horatio decides to go to his table and begin his writing. Teacher says: "Thanks for making a good choice Horatio".

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
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
